
Diversity Committee Middle School Updates for 4/29/19

Events that have happened since the January update that have a direct correlation with addressing our diversity needs:

- 1. During Homeroom we have conducted follow up activities 2-5 to our COV presentations from early January. These scheduled activities included:
 - a. Across the Great Divide- reinforce positive relationships
 - b. Alter Shake- reinforce Responsibility
 - c. Circle Clap-reinforcing a Culture of Value
 - d. Setting Goals- giving students ownership
- 2. Our culture committee will be working on other ways to keep the idea or respecting each other in the forefront. Building "Positive Peer Relationships" with our staff and students.
- 3. We have administered the Diversity Committee's survey to all grade levels.

Coming Soon:

- 1. Culture Committee meets on Wednesday 5/1 to discuss how to further our COV practices our existing students and how to introduce and begin the process with our incoming freshman and new students.
- 2. On Friday 5/3 our DPPD (professional development) will center on supporting students using COV as a lens. Topics include:
 - a. Native American Culture- Jannon Cotto
 - b. Autism-Kailee Bisbee
 - c. Race-Kathryn Curry
- 3. Students will be given a 2nd survey on school climate developed by the Teaching Tolerance initiative of the Southern Poverty Law Center which included question that reflects in part slurs and other racially sensitive behaviors. We plan on using this survey two times this year and see if we move the needle to the positive.
