The Diversity Committee consists of Hopkins Public Schools' staff, school board members, community members, alumni, community mental health, Jijak Foundation, Gun Lake Tribe, Pokagon Potawatomi Tribe with periodic support from other civic organizations.

District Programming

- Sycamore Elementary focuses on a positive behavior support system (The "A" Team) and "A"
 Team tickets are given out to students. Weekly drawings take place to recognize outstanding behavior and citizenship. Over 150 students are recognized each year.
- Hopkins Elementary utilizes the VIKES program which focuses on the positive behavior of all students. Thousands of tickets are given out each year and in each year over 200 students are recognized for outstanding behavior and citizenship.
- All middle school students and staff follow the
 positive behavior support system of the R.O.A.D.
 (Represent, Own, Achieve, and Discover). Each
 grade level team rewards students with R.O.A.D.
 tickets that are later used in drawings for prizes,
 auctions, or currency for "ROAD store purchases". This is another layer of support we use
 when teaching our students proper behavior and
 treatment of others.
- Hopkins High School integrates many cultural experiences in the existing curriculum. Some examples are:
 - Current Events class connects to a class in Singapore in order for students to share experiences.
 - World History classes bring in a variety of world religion leaders to share the premise of their religions.
 - Race Relation in America class allows students to examine race relations and racial discrimination in America.
 - Band and Choir selections include incorporating music of other cultures at least twice for each ensemble annually. These include African, Bosnian, Native American, Latin, Indian, Hebrew and several European pieces.
- All schools utilize guest speakers and experts to provide additional support for promoting positive behavior and expanding cultural and ethnic opportunities.
