From the Superintendent...

Another school year has come to a close and I would like to say congratulations to our newest Viking alumni – the members of the Class of 2018.

There are many news articles and stories questioning how well schools are educating our students today. I can tell you that at Hopkins Public Schools we are doing a pretty good job.

How do I know this? Our assessment scores are typically among the highest in the county and above the state averages, but this is only a small part of the big

picture. Students at Hopkins participate and are successful in numerous activities beyond the classroom.

Our robotics team participated in the World Championships again this year. Our agricultural science and FFA programs were recognized both nationally and within the state. Both our band and choir groups achieved top ratings in competitions this year. Our athletic teams brought home conference and district championships as well.

The first Early College cohort included five Hopkins students and over 40% of our juniors and seniors are taking dual enrollment, direct credit or advanced placement courses. If you had a chance to attend the honors convocation a few weeks ago, you probably noticed that Hopkins had several students receive awards within their vocational education programs at the Allegan Technology Center.

Although the accomplishments that I mentioned above relate to our high school students, I would like to point to one research finding that is worth consideration for those of you with young children. Parents that read to their children for at least ten minutes per day will prepare them to be college and career ready. Try that for ten years and your child will have a successful foundation forever. Finally, I hope you enjoy this edition of the Viking View as you see all of the great things that our students are doing.

Hopkins Public Schools will be seeking a Headlee Restoration of its operating millage in the August 7, 2018 election. Voter approval will allow the district to collect the full 18 mills on non-homestead property. This is not a new tax and without this the district cannot receive the full foundation allowance from the state. More information on this will be provided as we get closer to the election date. Thanks to the Tribe

Last August both elementary schools in our district received a grant from the Gun Lake Tribe that allowed the purchase of additional technology resources for our elementary students. These devices were appreciated and widely used by staff and students this year. If you know an elementary student, ask them how they used the devices and what they thought. We are grateful to the tribe for supporting this endeavor.

Sinking Fund

Last year the district utilized sinking fund dollars to address much needed asphalt repair, updated bleachers in the middle school gymnasium and reconfigured the middle school's main entrance to provide additional student and staff safety. This summer the high school's main entrance will be reconfigured to provide additional security as well. Additionally, the current high school art room will be relocated to the east wing to provide space for a new science lab. This will eliminate the need for one of our science teachers to provide instruction from a cart. You can monitor our progress on the district's website.

The top 400 teams from around the world came together at the World Championship in Detroit on April 28th. Over 40,000 people came to watch the fast-paced action and cheer on their team. Among them were the Hopkins Tech Vikes. The team earned their place in the championship by placing 36th out of the 506 teams in Michigan. The Hopkins team has been competing for 12 years and has made the championship 8 times. The Tech Vikes are tied for the 5th winningest team in Michigan. Students work with adult mentors to build a competitive robot. In the process they learn about design, mechanical, electrical and computer engineering, public speaking, project management and a lot about themselves. This program is meant to inspire them to want to learn more about careers and give them

This program works. Over 98% of the Tech Vike graduates have gone on to study STEM careers. Team members are also required to perform at least 10 hours of community service during the year. These include building active learning centers for the mentally impaired, building a planned bridge at the Wise Farm preserve and collecting toys for Helen DeVos Children's Hospital which turned out to be the largest single day donation at the hospital. Clearly we are building more than robots.


