ELIGIBLE CHILDREN HAVE THE RIGHT TO...

- Enroll in school immediately, even if lacking documents normally required for enrollment
- 2 Enroll in school and attend classes while the school gathers needed documents
- attending their school, or continue attending their school of origin (the school they last attended when permanently housed or the school in which they were last enrolled), if that is their preference and is feasible
- Receive transportation to and from their school if appropriate
- Receive transportation to and from their school if appropriate



You may qualify for certain rights and protections under the federal McKinney Vento Act

Do you live in any of the following situations?

Shelters: Living in emergency shelters, transitional shelters, or other types of shelters.

Motels/Campgrounds: Living in motels or campgrounds due to a lack of alternative housing options.

Vehicles: Living in cars, buses, or trains. Public Spaces/Abandoned Buildings: Living in parks, public spaces, or abandoned buildings.

Doubled-Up: Sharing housing with others due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason. This includes situations where families are living with friends or relatives because they cannot afford their own housing.

Substandard Housing: This can include housing that lacks utilities, is infested with vermin or mold, or lacks a working kitchen or bathroom.

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Assistance Act

The Act is a federal law that governs educational rights of children and youth in homeless situations. According to the McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act, a homeless person is an individual, including children and youth, who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence. If you and your family meet certain qualifications, the homeless education liaison at your school district can help you with a variety of services for you and your children.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION PROCEDURE

The McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act acknowledges that disputes may arise between the school district and transitioning student(s) and their parents/guardians when the student is placed in a school other than the one requested. Guidance for school selection is provided in the law. The law includes dispute resolution among the required duties of the LEA Liaison.

The following procedures are specified in the Act:

- Transitioning student is to be immediately enrolled in the school preferred by the parents until the dispute is settled
- School must provide a written explanation of the school placement decision to the parent/guardian or unaccompanied youth.
- They must also tell you in writing how you can appeal this decision.
- Liaison: The designated LEA liaison is assigned to carry out the dispute resolution in an expeditious manner.
