

By the time you read this, the 2015-2016 school will have come to an end. As this issue of the Viking View demonstrates, it has been another great year for Hopkins Public Schools. Our high school was awarded the Silver Medal for academic excellence by U.S. News & World Report. Individuals, teams and clubs also had great success during the year. Many of those have

Gary Wood during the year. Many of those have been highlighted in the newsletter. There have been numerous fundraising efforts throughout the school year showing that our students, staff and community have big hearts and a desire to help those in need.

Instructionally, our district continues to focus on RtI (Response to Intervention). If you have a child that still talks to you about what is happening at school, you may have heard about this. This is a multi-tier approach to the early identification and support of students with learning and behavior needs.

As is the case with most school districts in Michigan, adequate funding continues to be a challenge. Thank you for supporting our sinking fund proposal in May. These funds will allow us to make significant improvements to our facilities over the next five years. We also have an 18 mill non-homestead renewal on the August ballot. These locally generated funds are essential for our district to operate.

I would like to take the opportunity to say good luck to our staff members who are retiring and will not be returning to our schools in the fall. I wish you and your families the best going forward.

Finally, congratulations to all of our new Viking alumni. The Class of 2016 will be missed, and we wish them the best as they move on to the next stage of their lives. We are looking forward to our incoming kindergarten and young 5 students who will be joining our student body this fall.


Asian Elephant






Mrs. Merren's Flat People Travel to Texas

Hopkins FFA Chapter Receives High Honors at State Convention

East Lansing, MI -At the 88th Michigan FFA State Convention held at Michigan State University March 9-11. the Hopkins FFA Chapter was named top 10 in the state of MI through the National Chapter Award Program. In addition, 12 members received state recognition in leadership contests and/or state level awards.

Several members were recognized with a state level award based on their

academics and FFA involvement. Megan Heft, Alex Ludlam, Lexie Wilson, and Ashley Rodanhisler received an Academic Excellence award based on their GPA and participation in agriscience courses. Megan Heft and Alex Ludlam received their Outstanding Junior award based on their Supervised Agricultural Experience project, FFA involvement, and academics. Madeline Henrickson and Ashley Rodanhisler received their State FFA Degrees. This is the highest degree bestowed upon an FFA member at the state level based on income earned from their Supervised Agricultural Experience project outside of class, FFA involvement above the chapter level, and academics.

Alex Ludlam and Madeline Henrickson received state honors for their respective Supervised Agricultural Experience programs. Ludlam was named the state winner in Sheep Production based on her work on her family's sheep farm. She currently owns 28 ewes herself and assists her family with raising a flock of sheep that carries a specific trait called GM1 Gangliosidosis which is



being used in research to treat Huntington's disease. Madeline Henrickson the state winner in Agriscience Research Plant Systems through her work on her family's crop farm. With the support of her father, Henrickson has organized and conducted three years of soybean research on her family farm in Allegan.

Hopkins qualified in six state leadership contests by placing either first or second at the district and

regional level in February. Out of 29 students competing at the district level, 19 advanced to regionals, and 10 qualified for state. Three state competitors received silver medals - Mariah Marvin in Creed Speaking, Vanessa Veld in Junior High Speaking, and Samantha Modreske in Greenhand Speaking. Bailey Couch received a 4th place gold medal in Junior High Speaking. Megan Heft, Rachel Velderman, and Ashley Rodanhisler were named the state alternate team in Agricultural Issues with their presentation on Urban Chickens. Lexie Wilson, MaKenna Davies, and Laura Velderman, earned the honor of being named the state winning demonstration team with their demonstration titled, "Liquid Gold: Bee Keeping at its Best."

The FFA makes a positive difference in the lives of students by developing their potential for premier leadership, personal growth, and career success through agricultural education. The Michigan FFA Association operates as a state affiliate under the federally chartered National FFA Organization.

Hopkins eighth grade students traveled to DeVos Place in Grand Rapids on May 10th for CareerQuest 2016. This is a highly engaging hands-on career fair highlighting jobs in the fast-growing sectors of information technology, manufacturing, construction trades, and healthcare. Students were able to experiment with tools and machinery, see demonstrations of actual job tasks, and talk to experts in each field about how to be prepared for career success. This event, in addition to our visit to Western Michigan University later in May, caps off a number of college and career awareness activities that 8th graders have completed to prepare for their transition to high school.

On Friday, May 13th the HMS 7th graders took part in releasing 155 salmon at the Wise Preserve. It was the culmination of a six month classroom program called Salmon in the Classroom where local schools work with the Michigan DNR and Trout Unlimited Chapters. The salmon were raised in Mr Reszka's room starting out with 200 eggs in November. The fish in May are about 3-4 inches long and are ready to smolt. Many of the Hopkins 7th graders are hoping to come back in the Fall in three years when these chinook salmon should return as adults to begin their spawning ritual.

Congratulations to the Hopkins Junior Equestrian Team for winning the B Division District Championship!

The Hopkins Junior Equestrian team, comprised of 10 Middle School Students from Hopkins, St Stans, Innocademy (Zeeland) and Moline Christian, competed with 12 other schools from West Michigan at the MIHA District 19 Junior Equestrian Team Meet. The competition was held at the Barry County Expo Center near Hastings on May 14. They battled rain, wind and snow while they dominated the competition with many 1st place winners in many events including Western Equitation, Hunt Seat Equitation, Jumping, Reining, Trail, Cloverleaf Race, Flag Race, Stakes Race, Two Person Relay and Saddle Seat pattern.



7th Annual 5k

May 20, 2016 marked the seventh running of the Hopkins Middle School 5K. This year 341 students participated, as well as many of the Middle School staff. Students practiced for this race for two months during Phys. Ed. Some topics discussed during this unit were goal setting, pushing yourself, leaving your comfort zone, and not giving up, as well as running strategies such as pace, stride, and breathing.

Congratulations to Mary Wells, who broke the school record for 6th grade girls with a time of 24:19. Michael Barry (21:09) was the 6th grade boys winner. First place in the seventh grade went to Nate Rillema (21:23) and Paris Cornielle (26:09), both repeat winners. 8th grade winners were Grace Beckwith (24:27), her 3rd victory, and Todd Henley (19:36). Special recognition goes to those students who were able to improve their time from last year. Unfortunately, there are too many of these students to list.

One particular student was able to knock off 20 minutes from their 6th grade time to their 8th grade time!

Students were also asked to find friends or family to sponsor their 5K participation. Our students raised nearly \$800, all of which goes to the Annetta Jansen Food Pantry in Dorr, which serves nearly 600 local families every month. Top fundraisers were Tyler Weber, Gage Pepper, Trevor Kamphuis, and Ethan Howe. A big thank you goes to all students who helped raise this money and those in the community who sponsored a runner.


FIRST Robotics Wrap up for 2015/2016

The robotics teams from Hopkins Public schools had a very productive year. The season started in the fall with the high school team competing at Kettering and Zeeland. The team missed winning a three peat of the West Michigan Robotics Invitational by finishing in second place.

The middle school teams met from September through December and created a robot that could climb a mountain, rescue climbers and hang on a bar for extra points. The teams competed at Allendale and East Kentwood. One of the two teams finished in First and the other finished in second place at both events. The winning team finished in 4th place in the Michigan State Championship and earned a spot in the "Super Regional" in Iowa. They finished in 4th place out of the top 72 teams from 12 states in the Super Regional. Great Job Tech Vikes.



The High School team met from January through April and created very a competitive robot. The robot could drive over many obstacles such as moats. drawbridges, rock walls and go under a low bar to score balls



The team competed at GVSU and Kentwood High school. They finish in 2nd place at GVSU and 3rd place at Kentwood. They finish in 8 place out of 411 teams in the State of Michigan at the State Championship. The team also competed for the 6th straight year at the World Championship in St. Louis. The team finish the season in the top 4% of the over 4,000 teams from 38 countries from around the world.

It is now the "off Season" and the team is busy with Community Service projects. They have helped with the Team Dawson Lego Drive, demonstrated their robots to Governor Synder, helped at a Hospice charity event and entertained residents at Byron Manor. The summer will be filled with fun events like "Robo Camp", parade floats, sponsor visits and training for next year.

In 1985, Hopkins Public Schools received a unique gift. This gift, a 55 acre parcel of land now called the L.M. Wise Educational Preserve, is a gift of continuing significant value. The land is historically significant as it was where the areas first settlers put down roots in 1837.

When this generous donation was made by Mr. Wise, the Hopkins Area Education Foundation (H.A.E.F.) was created to carry out his wishes. He wanted to financially support school organizations and to develop and maintain the preserve for educational, historical, and recreational use long into the future.

The H.A.E.F. Mission

The Hopkins Area Education Foundation has been created to enhance the quality of life and education for the students and community members of the Hopkins Public Schools. The foundation will generate and distribute financial and other resources, beyond the normal operating budget of the Hopkins Public Schools and the Wise Educational Preserve to stimulate creative educational opportunities, expand community involvement from individuals, business and civic organizations and facilitate the growth and expansion of facilities and services of the Hopkins Public Schools and Wise Educational Preserve.

The H.A.E.F committee has generated funds for senior scholarships, FFA Washington Leadership conference, numerous teacher mini grants for classroom use, supported the school's play productions, music camp scholarships, the FFA Barn construction project, the football stadium, science awards, community baseball/softball field project, and we have donated to the Allegan County College Access Network.

At the Preserve the completion of removing dead ash trees and planting the last lawn area was completed this spring. Youth groups such as the Robotics team, FFA, various Boy Scouts groups, Eagle Scouts and Girl Scout troops spend numerous hours out at the preserve completing projects for community service credit.

For the past 22 years our main fundraiser has been "Get Away Weekend" and reverse raffle. All proceeds help to support the Wise Preserve and various scholarships /grants.
