HOPKINS PUBLIC SCHOOLS-CURRICULUM

As we enter this final stretch of the school year, the days continue to grow longer and the weather slowly begins to warm. With these welcome signs of spring comes "Testing Season". Shortly after Spring Break, all 3rd-8th and 11th grade students will be taking the Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) or SAT assessments.

The M-STEP is a 21st Century computer-based assessment designed to gauge how well students are mastering state standards. These standards, developed for educators by educators, outline what students should know and be able to do in order to be prepared to enter the workplace, career education training and college. When combined with classroom work, report cards, district level assessments and other tools, M-STEP results offer a comprehensive view of student progress and achievement.



HPS WELCOMES A SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

Hopkins Public Schools was fortunate enough to receive a grant from the Office of School Safety that will allow for the addition of a School Resource Officer (SRO). The SRO position is partially supported by the FY23 grant funds awarded by the State of Michigan and administered by the Michigan State Police.

According to Superintendent Gary Wood, the district has entered into an agreement with the Allegan County Sheriff's Office to provide a full-time deputy for this purpose beginning March 1, 2023. The SRO will service all of the schools in the district.

Deputy Tracey Keefauver has been selected for this position. Deputy Keefauver has worked for the Allegan County Sheriff's Office for two years. When asked about her new role, she stated, "I've enjoyed working as a Road Patrol Deputy but I'm so excited to step into the school resource officer position. I can't wait to work with the students and get to know them all. I've had extensive training to prepare me for my new role and I look forward to working with HPS making the school a safe environment for everyone!"

The SRO will assist the district in ensuring the physical safety of the individuals in its schools. They will help to develop and update safety procedures, emergency operations plans and implement best practices. They will help educate students in law-related topics and provide staff with safety training as needed.

"Not only is this a great opportunity for the district, but also for the community. Just think, there will be a deputy in our community every school day that can rapidly respond to emergency situations that occur.", Wood stated.

HOPKINS HIGH SCHOOL

The Hopkins High School Band had 16 students participate in this year's District Solo and Ensemble at Wyoming High School in Grand Rapids on Saturday February 4th. Students performed both solo and ensemble pieces for judges and were awarded first and second division ratings. All students took home a medal from the event and almost every group qualified for State Solo and Ensemble in March. Congratulations Viking Band on all your hard work!

Guest Greeter

Every morning as students enter the building, they are greeted by Mrs. Fredricks who says, "Good morning!" She was amazed at the number of students who do not even acknowledge someone when they say hello and do not respond. With a little thought and creativity, she started the "Special Guest Greeter" project. Young Five and Kindergarten students assist each morning, wearing a special badge of honor. It is their job to say good morning to every student who enters and Mrs. Fredricks then encourages the other students to return the morning greeting. At this point of the year, the program pretty much runs itself and students are greeting each other and adults. Ms. Mielke likes to say, "Manners matter" and good manners are contagious.

Social Emotional Learning

Kindergarten and Young Fives classes engage in weekly social emotional learning and character development lessons. Each Friday, the classes meet for character trait lessons focusing on a monthly theme such as problem solving, leadership, gratitude, or sportsmanship. During February they are focusing on courage while learning about courageous leaders like Ruby Bridges. In the classroom, students learn social emotional skills such as responding to big feelings with coping skills like deep breaths or calming yoga poses.



2ND GRADE CELEBRATES LITERACY



As a part of our "March is Reading Month" festivities HES 2nd graders were able to explore and celebrate some of their favorite books. Each student brought their favorite book from home, or chose one from school, to write an opinion piece about and share with others. Students enjoyed showing off their favorite books and recommending them to their peers.

4TH GRADE POSTCARD PROJECT

In 4th grade social studies, we learn about the United States and its different regions. To expand our knowledge about our country, 4th grade students and their families reached out to people who lived in other states and asked them to send us a postcard with interesting facts about their state. Every time we get a new postcard, we read it in class, color the state on our map, and add it to our growing bulletin board. We have collected 36 of the 50 states so far!
